EXHIBITS

"A Brush With Springtime"
March 30 to May 8, 2022
The Galleries at Quiet Waters Park

Plans are underway for our exhibit at Quiet Waters Park in April. It's not necessary to adhere to the springtime theme; but, after a long, cold winter in isolation, paintings welcoming the "greening" season will surely be appreciated by everyone who views your paintings.

Here are some of the details:

Our judge for the awards will be the noted Pennsylvania watercolorist, Mick McAndrews. The entries will be judged on the quality of the artwork, not on their adherence to the theme of the exhibit. *All entries will be accepted and prizes will be awarded*.

The application will be available on our AWC website by mid-February. You will receive an announcement by email when registration opens. All details will be available on the website with the application form. All applications and payments must be made by March 1st.

There will be space for about 100 paintings in the galleries, so at least two paintings per artist, and possibly a third one, depending on the number of artists participating. On the application please list the two paintings that you most want to enter, with a third as an option (We will let you know if we have room for your third painting). Please be sure to attach a label to the back of each piece listing: title, price, and your contact information (name, address, phone, email, website).

You will be asked for a photo of each painting, if possible. Please try to photograph it

before framing behind glass. These will help the judge familiarize himself with the paintings before the exhibit opens, though he will only make his selections upon viewing the actual art work. Photos will also be helpful for use in exhibit publicity and for viewing on our website, with your consent.

Framed paintings to be exhibited should only be originals (no giclée reproductions). For safety reasons, if the glazing is larger than 54 united inches total (height plus width) it must be plexi or acrylic. Glass is acceptable for anything under 54 united inches.

We will have our AWC bins available for matted work so there will be room for three matted original paintings or giclée reproductions per artist. Please be sure they are either sealed in a cellophane sleeve or wrapped in plastic. There should be a label on the back giving your contact information, title, price and whether it is an original or a giclée reproduction. Photos of matted work in bins will *NOT* be required.

There is a \$20 application fee, payable on the website through PayPal or your credit card. The Friends of Quiet Waters, who always do a beautiful job of managing the exhibits, retain a 25% commission on all sales.

For unloading your art work, short-term parking is available beside the building near the dumpsters and heating unit. There is a doorway providing access to the elevator. Short- term parking is also available in the circle in front of the building (look for the flagpoles), and a door that leads to the same elevator. You are strongly discouraged from parking in the handicap parking spaces nearest to the front door, as that area is sometimes patrolled and you could receive a \$500 ticket!

For this exhibit, we would appreciate some volunteer assistance in a few areas:

Receiving and Pick up: On the day of receiving (Tuesday, March 29, 9 - 10 am), it would be very helpful if a few volunteers could meet artists at the doors, carefully help unload their paintings and bring them into the gallery and sign them in. At the end of the exhibit (Sunday, May 8, 2:00 to 3:30), we could use a few people to sign out and help artists bring their paintings to their cars.

Hospitality and Reception: The reception will be on Sunday afternoon, April 3, 1:30 to 3:30 pm, and will be held on the porch outside of the gallery. It would be helpful if a few volunteers would be willing to purchase the individual containers of beverages and snacks (reimbursable of course), and be available during the reception to set up and host, as well as clean up afterwards.

Linda is an internationally recognized fine arts professional. She was raised in Delaware County, Pennsylvania but has lived in many states. The first solo exhibit of her paintings opened on her 21st birthday at the Widener Museum of Art in Chester, Pennsylvania. Her realistic watercolors and oils reflect the Brandywine tradition that surrounded Linda in her youth. Landscapes are her first love and primary subject matter, however, people, animals, flowers and still life are painting subjects as well.

Linda has enjoyed a long career as a professional artist and has been commissioned by a variety of professional and private clients such as the Hershey Trust, Hilton, Franklin Mint and Sterling Vineyards to do paintings for them of this country, Europe and Africa. These works hang in public and private collections here and around the world. Her largest commission to date has been that of a 98 foot by 7 foot mural on the rotunda ceiling of the Association of Baptists Worldwide Evangelism headquarters in New Cumberland, Pennsylvania. The mural depicts 32 different countries where the mission is active. Working overhead, using two levels of scaffolding, it took 5 years to complete this remarkable oil painting. It is open to the public for view by request.

Linda enjoys her life as a professional artist. She is the past president of the Annapolis Watercolor Club and enjoys teaching at Maryland Hall for the Creative Arts, in Lancaster, Pennsylvania, and her private students. Her website lindaluke.com has information about her paintings, commissioning a painting and her upcoming exhibits. She currently resides in Annapolis, Maryland with her husband Peter and their little dog Josie. Linda often says, "I'm happy when I paint…I hope that shows!"
